## **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

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## INDICATORS OF EXPLOITATION

- Forced to work
- · Abused or frightened by your boss
- Threatened or hurt at work
- · Working in an unsafe place
- Not being allowed to leave your place of work or leave your job
- Living at work
- Not allowed to talk to other people at work
- · Not being paid properly
- Being paid differently to other people doing the same job
- · Working long hours with few days off
- Having a large debt that you have to pay back
- Not being able to see a doctor or go to a hospital
- Promised one kind of work but have to do different work
- Your passport and other personal documents are kept by your employer and you are not allowed to have them when you want them

## **HOW TO GET HELP?**

You are not alone and you can get help.

If you or someone you know is being exploited, Anti-Slavery Australia can give free and confidential legal advice. We can also refer you to other agencies for help.
